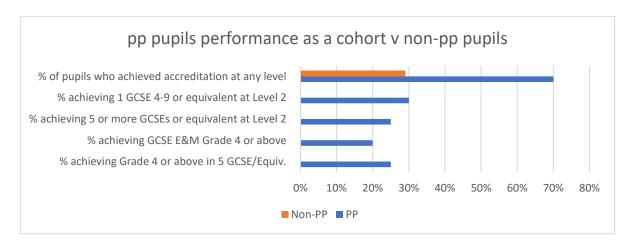

#### **Barriers to Attainment**

### **External Barriers**

- Attendance due to the complex needs, high anxiety
- Local community a lot of pupils live in areas of high deprivation and unemployment
- Home circumstances

### **Internal Barriers**

- All pupils have either an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) or complex special educational needs
- Low self-esteem and high anxiety
- Complex social, emotional and mental health challenges
- Communication difficulties, often displayed through outward facing/challenging behaviour

## **Research Informed/Value for Money**

Westbury Academy is committed to research led improvement/intervention and ensuring value for money in the allocation of pupil premium. The academy aims to evaluate the cost and efficacy of intervention using guidance from the external organisations e.g. Education Endowment Fund (EFF) and, where possible, utilises high impact/low cost strategies. Interventions that have not be considered by the EEF will be have a significant research/evidence base in relation to their effectiveness. However, it must be noted the PP allocation/strategy is under review and new strategy will be in place for September 2021.
